ALL of our vaccines are thimerosol (mercury) free!

DTaP (Diptheria, Tetanus, Pertussis): bacteria in the community that causes serious illnesses of the throat.

IPV (Inactivated Polio Virus): causes nerves (especially legs) of the body to stop working properly.

**HIB** (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B): bacteria that can cause serious infections throughout the body including ears, sinuses, and brain (meningitis).

**HBV** (Hepatitis B Virus): a virus that destroys the liver over time.

**Prevnar** (Streptococcus Pneumonia): protects against 13 serotypes of this bacteria that causes serious infections throughout the body including ears, sinuses, and brain (meningitis).

Rotovirus: a virus that causes vomiting and diarrhea. This vaccine is oral (given by mouth).

Varivax: (Chickenpox): a virus that causes that red, itchy rash.

**MMR** (Measles, Mumps, Rubella): viruses that cause rash, flu-like illnesses. This vaccine can no longer be separated.

**TDaP** (Tetanus, Diptheria, Pertussis): the big kid version of the above DTaP. This is a booster dose.

Menactra (Meningococcal): a bacteria that causes a very dangerous and deadly brain infection.

Gardasil (Human Papillomavirus (HPV)): a virus that can cause genital warts and cervical cancer.

Combination vaccines available: **Pentacel** (DTaP, IPV, HIB) – given at age 2, 4, 6 months **Kinirix** (DTaP, IPV) – given at age 4 years **Proquad** (MMR, Varivax) – given at age 4 years

Other vaccines available but not given routinely in our practice: Hepatitis A Vaccine, yearly Influenza Vaccine
